Along with the pigs, dogs, and donkeys, three goats and two alpacas rounded out the make-shift petting zoo.

Sarah's Smile participant Joseph especially liked the alpacas. "When you say something to them, they answer back," he said.

Gress Mountain Ranch owner Kathryn Jean Gress says she has always possessed a passion for animals. Since 2002, she and her husband Ben have rescued nearly 30 abandoned and unwanted animals, offering both large and small creatures "forever" homes at their Orefield them to help people," Gress said. "We are truly a place where people help animals and animals help people."

Third-grader James is not only a Sarah's Smile participant, but he also volunteers at the ranch, offering Gress his help and gaining knowledge about the



various animals. "I love working with all of the animals," said James, who Gress said is one of her hardest workers. "It's
